

RICHMOND CITY COUNCIL

AUGUST 19, 2008

The regular meeting of the Richmond City Council was held at the Richmond Community Building located at 6 West Main, Richmond, UT on August 19, 2008. The meeting began at 7:00 P.M. Mayor Michael Hall was in the chair. The opening remarks were made by Chris Purser.

The following Council members were in attendance: Brad Jensen, Keith Ward, Jeff Young and Terrie Wierenga. Allen Lundgreen was excused.

A motion to accept the July 15, 2008 City Council meeting minutes was made by Keith, seconded by Terrie and the vote was unanimous.

DEPUTY REPORT

MAYOR: Deputy Nyberg has been reassigned to Hyrum City. I have talked with Deputy Carley and the Sheriff's office is planning on attending the City party. They will have the regular equipment they come with every year at this year's party as well.

PUBLIC SAFETY PRESENTATION

JALAIN HAWKES: Thank you for the opportunity to come before you tonight. I am in the process of going to all the cities and towns in the valley to provide awareness of what we do and offer. It is a great place to work at the dispatch center. Currently, there are 19 dispatchers. We are located at 290 North 100 West in Logan. We currently service 26 separate agencies and 120,000 citizens. Last year 214,740 calls were received of which 29,100 were 911 calls. That is an average of 588 calls per day. Since 2003, there has been a 55% increase in calls. There are now three dispatchers working on all shifts. We each receive yearly training. We have knowledge to help with medical procedures over the phone such as CPR. All calls are timed. 4 P.M. to 11 P.M. is the busiest amount of calls. Lots of calls come from cell phones. In some cases citizens are unsure of their address location as they are driving and it is hard to get an accurate location. This requires a lot on the job training. We do; however, have a high turnover rate.

MAYOR: Who are the miscellaneous agencies you work with?

JALAIN: The Utah Department of Wildlife Resources, Adult Parole and Probation Services are a couple.

TERRIE: Jalaine, is it possible to get a tour of the center?

JALAIN: Yes, there are tours for the general public. They just need to be scheduled in advance. Afternoon/evening time is best as that is when the most calls come through. **TERRIE:**

It would be good to see youth groups get a tour to see what you do.

JALAIN: Sometimes it is nice to link a voice to a face. We are just normal people.

TERRIE: It would be nice to see the newest technology as well.

JALAIN: Cell phone technology is changing all the time.

BRAD: What calls don't you want to receive on the 911 lines?**JALAINE:** That is one of our biggest questions. We get lots of calls from the elderly. We are their easiest call for very unnecessary items; such as they could not find a phone number they needed as well as it is convenient just to dial our number. The number to the center is 753-7555, which is for incident reporting. There are only so many lines to accept 911 calls and it would be terrible to miss calls for unnecessary items. There is more leniency on cell phone calls.

MAYOR: Can we put this information in our newsletter?

JALAINE: That would be great. Thanks for allowing me to take a few minutes of your time.

GIBBONS/SKABELUND REZONE REQUEST

MAYOR: This goes back to the discussion and public hearing at the last Council meeting in regards to the rezone request from Dr. Gary Gibbons. There could not be a formal vote that evening as a formal vote was not listed on the agenda.

A motion to accept the rezone request on the property located between approximately 900 North (Richmond) and 10600 North (Cache County) from State Street (Richmond) to the Eastern Richmond City boundary from current A-10 designation to 111 acres of Residential Low Density (RLD) and 20 acres from A-10 designation to Residential Medium Density (RMD) with the remaining approximate 20 acres remaining at A-10 designation; was made by Terrie, seconded by Jeff and the vote was unanimous.

MONTE & KAREN FRANSDEN IMPACT FEE APPEAL

MAYOR: The appeal by Monte Frandsen was discussed at the last Council meeting and tabled for further discussion and information gathering. After reviewing the request with City Attorney Bruce Jorgensen, a letter has been drafted, the billing for the issue submitted and I have talked with Monte about the specifics of the letter and the billing. The letter will have to be notarized by the Frandsen's and then the letter recorded to the property that the connection be restored to its historical usage. The letter also stipulates the property cannot be split in the future. The Frandsen's will be responsible to pay the attorney costs to review this subject as well as the recording fees.

A motion to accept the Water and Sewer Impact Fee appeal by Monte & Karen Frandsen with the stipulation that the letter prepared by Bruce Jorgensen be recorded to the property and the incurred expenses paid by the Frandsen's was made by Terrie, seconded by Keith and the vote was unanimous.

BRAD: When approached with an issue like this in the future we need to gather as much information as possible up front. This was two separate issues from the start. We need specifics, not general information.

SMOKE FREE VENUE PRESENTATION

HOLLY BUDGE: Allen Grunig and I are attending tonight to let you know one of the requirements to attain Gold Medal status as part of the Healthy Communities Award program. Your City parks would need to be smoke free venues and this can be done with the passing of an ordinance. This is required as the Surgeon General has issued a warning to protect the community from second hand smoke. Smokers are not a protected class. Second hand smoke can cause people with disabilities to have more problems. I have gathered some information and only two cities in the Salt Lake Valley do not have such an ordinance and both of those cities are currently working on one. Logan City has an ordinance and it is regularly enforced; more so during the Cruise-In celebration each year. Signage is key. Some issues are health problems and litter. The question is; is such an ordinance right for Richmond? 93.2% of the people located in Rich, Cache and Box Elder counties do not smoke. Most smokers are very considerate. We want to help them quit. We offer funding for the signage with our tag line attached. The Salt Lake City ordinance was researched heavily and is lawful and enforceable.

TERRIE: Are outdoor areas with a designated smoking area feasible?

HOLLY: Yes. It is up to each city. Our preference is to see it all smoke free.

MARLOWE: Isn't that discrimination?

HOLLY: They are not a protected class and it cannot be litigated. Herff Jones recently went smoke free for their entire area inside and out. It is a city decision on whether to have designated areas or not.

MARLOWE: Herff Jones is private property. Have there been any challenges to this ordinance dealing with public properties?

HOLLY: It is currently being enforced in 350 jurisdictions and some entire European countries.

TERRIE: No matter what some groups will always be upset. Some jurisdictions try to appeal to all.

ALLEN GRUNIG: I have heard/read of an asthmatic person that sued a city because of second hand smoke and won. Tobacco is not a protected class and asthmatics are a protected class.

TERRIE: I know that smokers lost their lawsuit in Rapid City.

HOLLY: The Clean Air Act was passed in 1994.

JEFF: I like the idea of complete designation. I have cleaned up areas that contain smoker paraphernalia and it is terrible. These areas are where youth are present. I see no reason to designate a specific area.

HOLLY: I think you should do what is good for the majority. Logan Regional Hospital will soon be completely smoke free.

ALLEN GRUNIG: You need to look at the population as a whole, what is good for the entire community? Second hand smoke can have a big impact on people's lives for the worse. Our mission; is to inform, educate, and protect the citizens. We protect from many more things than just smoking.

HOLLY: We want to help encourage people to quit.

MAYOR: If Richmond City were to adopt such an ordinance, would Bear River Health Department supply the necessary signage?

HOLLY: Yes. We have already assessed your parks.

ALLEN GRUNIG: Cache County has not adopted such an ordinance yet.

MAYOR: We will consider drafting such an ordinance and consider it on a future agenda.

TERRIE: I would like to ask the public for their input, smokers and nonsmokers.

JEFF: I am in favor of an ordinance. Let's put this information in the newsletter.

KEITH: I agree with Jeff.

BRAD: The majority of smokers are very considerate; it is our responsibility to protect citizens from those that are not considerate. I think it is a great idea and I am in favor of it.

MAYOR: Let's put this information on the September meeting agenda with a formal vote at the October meeting.

HOLLY: Can we attend? We will bring some examples of the signage.

MAYOR: Yes.

KEITH: Would you recommend we follow Salt Lake's ordinance?

HOLLY: Yes.

MARLOWE: I would suggest we slightly modify it.

HOLLY: Hyde Park made theirs more simple, Smithfield made theirs the same.

HARVEST FARMER'S MARKET

TERRIE: I have provided each of you a summary page of what I have found regarding a healthy food policy for the community as well as information on a harvest market. A formal resolution would need to be passed for us to officially accept the policy. The only places this would currently affect would be the Black & White Days celebration and the city party. We are already doing as suggested/required we just need a formal resolution. I can supply a draft at the next meeting. Nanette Miller has presented several ideas in the past, one of them being a harvest market. Nothing is required as far as permits if it is fresh produce/fruit and it is not cut or sampled. We would just need to specify a date and time. If people wanted to have prepared food, they would need to get an individual permit. I would suggest we charge a nominal vendor fee to cover wear and tear and clean up. I think it would be good to try.

MARLOWE: In Provo, it creates a huge amount of traffic. I would suggest using the west soccer field; it has better restroom facilities and parking.

BRAD: Where the horse trailers park during Black & White?

MARLOWE: Yes. There would be no electrical power there.

TERRIE: When?

JEFF: That area would need to be watered more beforehand. It is dryer than other areas. It would be hard to install canopy spikes right now.

TERRIE: It needs to be publicized to be successful; radio, TV and the newspaper. I would suggest a \$5.00 booth fee.

MARLOWE: Date?

TERRIE: How about the first three Saturdays of September as a trial run, from 9:00 A.M. to noon?

MARLOWE: How about the four Saturdays in September?

TERRIE: Yes. I will be in charge.

HAUNTED MANSION UPDATE

JAMIE FORBUSH: It is good to be back before you. I have provided you with a Letter of Intent, which summarizes our finances from last year, explains the situation with CV Wireless and explains our long range plans. When we first bought the building, Cache Valley Wireless, told us they just needed a place to have signal like the Cingular Tower that is on city property near by. This eventually turned into a business located in our building and I was unaware of it until Paul Berntson notified me. They have since moved out. We are ready to go ahead with year two this fall. I am waiting for approval from the Building Inspector and Fire Chief. There are a few electrical items that need immediate repair as well as a few crumbling bricks. Last year we requested that our property be smoke free as well for the entire property.

MAYOR: What are your plans, dates?

JAMIE: We would like to open on Friday, September 19th, and run through Saturday, November 1st. At the start we won't open on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday, but will open Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Then the last two weeks of October we will run every day but Sunday. Last year was a good year, I think this year will be better. All of our funds last year were spent on the building.

MARLOWE: Are you aware the south overhead door is open?

JAMIE: It should be closed, somebody must have been working down there.

BRAD: What about traffic? Last year people were circling trying to find your location. You were hard to find for some people.

JAMIE: We plan on having some big reflective signs the size of a sheet of plywood. We want people to turn at Big J's and come down.

BRAD: What about Main Street access?

JAMIE: We want people to exit onto Main Street only. Our hours Monday through Thursday will be 7:00 P.M. to 10:30 P.M. and then 7:00 to midnight on Friday and Saturday. We will stop selling tickets at midnight.

TERRIE: Please be aware there is a sign ordinance.

MARLOWE: We would need to grant a waiver as the signs he is referring to are illegal.

MAYOR: We could approve those at the next meeting.

BRAD: You are talking about putting the sign at 200 South and 500 West by the Richmond City Maintenance Shop?

JAMIE: Yes. Do I need to attend the next meeting?

MAYOR: There is no reason for you to attend unless you want to.

JAMIE: The building inspector is the key to our success. Our building is safer than some public buildings. The oldest part of the building is 106 years old and some ghost hunting teams have expressed an interest in touring the building as well as TAPS from the Discovery Channel.

BRAD: Is the fire suppression system working?

JAMIE: No. We have enough exits that it is not required. The suppression system is very dilapidated.

BRAD: Is your plan to get it repaired in the future?

JAMIE: Yes. Also to have some public restrooms in the building and make it so that the building is usable year round. Right now we are using port-a-potties.

JEFF: I am glad you have a family type environment. That is an important part for many of those that are attending.

MARLOWE: Your business license can be paid for and picked up at anytime.

MAYOR: I appreciate you attending the many meetings that you have in the past.

BUSINESS LICENSES

HOPKINS ENTERPRISES

MARLOWE: Mollyanne Hopkins could not attend this evening and asked me to speak in her behalf. She wants to have a home based business where she purchases name brand clothing at discounted prices and then resells it. She would like a license as well as be able to put flyers on porches.

MAYOR: How are the items shipped/delivered?

JEFF: What about traffic?

MARLOWE: I would assume the product would be delivered by UPS/Fed Ex.

BRAD: We need to talk about the flyers. I don't like them.

TERRIE: I don't like the door to door idea.

JEFF: I don't care about flyers myself.

TERRIE: We have approved in the past.

A motion to approve the business license for Hopkins Enterprises was made by Keith, seconded by Jeff and the vote was as follows: Jeff – Yes, Keith – Yes, Terrie – Yes, Brad – No, license approved by a vote of 3-1.

THROUGH A CHILD'S EYES DISCOVERY PRESCHOOL

CANDICE NAGATA: I want to operate a hands on preschool.

JEFF: How many children at a time?

CANDICE: Not many. My liability insurance will only allow eight total children and I have three of my own so that allows for a maximum of five children at a time.

TERRIE: Can we get a copy of your state certification?

CANDICE: I am running a preschool and not a day care. I didn't know I needed anything.

TERRIE: You will need to contact Bear River Health Department to double check and if required provide us a copy of the certification.

Approved by Council when a copy of any required certification if required is provided

BRAD: Are there any homeowner's association rules that would prevent this business?

CANDICE: No.

COMMUNITY BUILDING CONCERT UPDATE

JEREMY THRELFALL: Thanks for allowing us to have the concerts in the community building. The first one, five people attended. The second concert was a success due to the help of Chris and Marlowe helping put free tickets in with the monthly utility billing statements. My

goal is to fill the theatre, there were around 80-85 people to the second concert which was called Vocalocity.

CHRIS PURSER: It was too hot.

JEREMY: I forgot to turn on the air conditioner beforehand. I would like to continue with one concert a month.

JEFF: Maybe we can come up with a general sign to make announcements such as this.

TERRIE: I will put the information on the website as well.

JEREMY: I have an idea, I would like to put a sign on the roof of this building that says "Theatre" right now it says City Hall.

JEFF: Some signs are very tacky.

JEREMY: It would be a wood design and I would want the Council to approve it. I noticed that the lamp posts are empty, could I put the theatre directions on them?

MARLOWE: There are 62 lamp posts, and there is no way to feasibly maintain them, it is a UDOT road.

MAYOR: Down the road it is something we might be able to consider.

CITY MANAGER REPORT

MARLOWE: Kimberly Pence, PTA President at Park Elementary would like to have Checkett's Amusements attend their September 4th carnival but they need permission to use the soccer field to put the amusement items on. Checkett's do have liability insurance. The use of electricity would be the only issue/expense if the City allows this. It would take one day to assemble the rides, one day of use, and one day to take them down. It is not a fundraiser but Checkett's amusements are going to make a donation to Park Elementary. There are some inflatable and mechanical rides.

JEFF: I want Checkett's contact information so I can see if we can use some of the items at the city party.

MAYOR: Tell them to move forward with this. The City will donate the electricity.

MARLOWE: Concrete is being poured at the MBR plant. The walls for the tanks are currently being formed. Right now the project is on schedule. There is a transformer issue but that is an issue between AQUA and Buzz Electric. The culinary water testing rules have changed, the frequency will be more often but the cost will remain the same. It will just require more of my time. I would like to commend the citizens for their water conservation this year. I did not have to turn the well on until July 29th this year, last year it was turned on July 6th. The SCADA system is working great. Both meter reading wands broke last month and are being repaired.

TERRIE: These are high water use months, how is the bill being split?

CHRIS: We are going to adjust the minimum to 20,000 gallons rather than the normal 10,000 gallon basis.

MARLOWE: There will be an advertisement in the newspaper for a wastewater/culinary operator job. I have visited with one gentleman that has level four licensing and he has an interest. The advertisement will post by the end of August.

MAYOR: I want someone hired by January 2009 at the latest.

MARLOWE: Maybe by November. Be ready for the interview process as you will all be involved.

BRAD: This salary was included in the projections of the system. I would like this job to eventually include doing the culinary testing at some point.

MARLOWE: I am responsible for that currently. I have been told this job will take 9-12 months of intensive training then about 30 hours per week.

JUSTIN: I would suggest this person have their CDL or be able to obtain it so if they need to help with snow removal or other areas in town this won't be an issue.

FINANCIAL REPORT

JUSTIN: Boyd and I will be out of town on the date of the next Council meeting. Either I need to request we move the meeting or we will need to find someone to take the minutes.

MAYOR: Let's move it to Wednesday, September 3rd at 7:00 P.M.

JUSTIN: I will get it advertised. We are going to need to allocate approximately \$1,800 for the purchase of the nozzles for the new fire truck. We have a \$300,000 truck that came without the nozzles and cannot function without them.

BRAD: Tomorrow, there will be a fire truck demonstration at 6:00 P.M.

JUSTIN: The Gibbons/Skabelund interest payment on the well purchase was made last month. I see that we received an invoice from AQUA from 2006?

MARLOWE: When I was preparing the first draw on the MBR Plant it was brought to my attention that AQUA was out of balance on their numbers and it was determined that they had never submitted to us an invoice from 2006 work.

JUSTIN: Still in the process of preparing for the upcoming audit the first week of November. Sadler's were paid \$13,191 for their sidewalk work at the Cub River Sports Complex. The paperwork has been submitted to get these funds reimbursed from Cache County as this was a RAPZ tax approved project. Three water/sewer impact fees were collected in July. Chris, please contact Julie at Lewiston City and ask that they send all of their payments, expenses from the last budget year in regards to the Cub River Sports Complex.

COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS

BRAD: The new fire truck has finally arrived and the department is very happy. They are currently installing equipment such as hoses. I am going to defer an update on the water/sewer to the Mayor. A list of maintenance items has been prepared and will be done by fall. There is one nuisance complaint that is being addressed. Do we have an ordinance in regards to abandoned vehicles in the city park strip? These are vehicles that are unlicensed and not running but have been parked in the park strip. I need the ordinance information in this regard. Several properties are getting worse.

TERRIE: The ordinance encompasses more than just vehicles.

BRAD: No new complaints have been formally filed this year. I have brought a drawing of the new park pavilion for everyone to review. This shows the location, size and is a very nice concept drawing. I would like to put this laminated photo down at the park for people to see and mention that volunteers are "Making Life Better" as our motto states. The building permit has been issued. The project could start as soon as tomorrow. I would like some input on how we connect the sidewalks from each pavilion to the entertainment pavilion.

MAYOR: Will both pavilions connect to the entertainment pavilion?

BRAD: Yes.

JEFF: I would like to see the sidewalks connect, not go separately to the pavilion.

BRAD: All of your input is helpful. We might need more RAPZ tax money down the road to complete this project. Only one sprinkler has to be moved so that is a plus.

JEFF: We are getting a new net for the tennis court and volleyball court as well as a ratchet system. We are going to get a sign posted so there won't be any bikes or skateboards on the tennis courts. The bikes and skateboards ride over the net and ruin it. The new ratchet system will have locks installed on it so the nets cannot be let down. I would like to put in the newsletter that tennis rackets and balls can be loaned for use on the local court. Al's Sporting Goods gave us a really good deal on these items. Volleyball's will be available for use as well. We are going to remove the rock hard sand in the volleyball court and replace it with beach sand. I want it done for the city party. My brother-in-law was recently pulled over by a police officer for riding an ATV on the paved road. The officer was very nice but said he would issue a warning this time but must enforce the law and it would result in a ticket next time. He said we would need to change our ordinance to allow this. I don't see why, if licensed and insured, and abiding by the driving laws that a ticket needs to be issued.

TERRIE: I attended a meeting a long time ago where 35 people expressed their desire to limit ATV use on the roads. It was being abused and non street legal vehicles were being used such as the mini motorcycles. I understand your point of view on this. There are usually about 10-12 repeat offenders. However; if not street legal then it is illegal.

JEFF: What is the process of changing this?

TERRIE: Ride on a trail.

JUSTIN: I agree with Jeff. I don't see any reason that I should not be allowed to drive my ATV from my house to another member of my families that live in Richmond. My ATV is licensed and insured and if I am following the speed limit I think I should legally be allowed to do so. My kids always wore their helmets. I should be allowed to do this.

JEFF: I agree there should be guidelines for allowing this. The officer was just following the rules but was very clear he will issue a ticket for repeat offense. I would be more than willing to gather names for approval/support of this. **DAREK KIMBALL:** I thought a husbandry permit allowed paved road usage?

MARLOWE: Yes, it does if it has a license plate, turn signals, headlights, then it is street legal.

JEFF: Why? This is an issue for me. I will gather more information and present to the Council if necessary.

TERRIE: I don't have an ATV myself. I am a strong advocate of enforcing the ordinance.

DAREK: My understanding was that ATV's such as the Kawasaki Mule, Yamaha Rhino could not even be registered at all.

JEFF: I don't want to knowingly break the rules but think this should be allowed.

BRAD: I have my State of Utah vehicle safety inspection license and the rules on Mule type vehicles and ATV's has changed. They can now be inspected but I don't know the requirements.

JEFF: What do I need to do?

TERRIE: I think we should all read the ordinance.

MAYOR: Let's discuss again at the September meeting.

JEFF: As for the City party. It will be the same as last year. Lower's meat, I will need eight cookers, and help cutting the meat. Allen's beans, L.D.'s condiments, as well as the Coke machine. The Fire Department is going to do some water games. I don't want this to be a burden on anyone. I will also contact Cordell, Kip and Boyd and see if they would be willing to help as well.

TERRIE: Would you like me to get the food permit?

JEFF: Yes.

BRAD: You need to clarify with Ben exactly what you want from the Fire Department, I think there is some confusion on this.

MAYOR REPORT

MAYOR: I have given each of you an update on the proposed countywide library system. This will require more discussion and a meeting down the road for a formal vote.

TERRIE: They are hiring a specialist to see if it is even financially feasible.

MAYOR: We will review down the road.

TERRIE: I have supplied our librarians with a copy of the proposal as well.

MAYOR: North Logan City is not on board as we were previously informed; they are still reviewing.

BRAD: I also think it is very premature to think that USU is on board.

MAYOR: I have provided a copy of the annual J-U-B golf tournament information for anyone wanting to attend. On September 26th, at 7:30 P.M. at Coppermill, Governor Huntsman will be giving a speech. J-U-B has provided a copy of their proposal for the culinary water model, and water tank development which we will discuss later. We have made a proposal to Eric Brooksby. The city would acquire one acre of property from the Brooksby family but he needs to ask his brothers and mother their opinions on it. In return for the one acre of property the city will trade "X" amount of years of culinary water use as well as a culinary water hookup on a non-pressurized line but it will be treated. I want a win/win situation for both sides. This also saves them the cost of having to drill a well. They will let me know very soon.

DAREK KIMBALL: Since the Master Plan was completed we have added the new proposed water tank as well as the water well that was purchased in the same area.

MAYOR: I have had a meeting with Darek and Zan Murray. We are going to ask to move the location of the well from on the Palmer area to the new proposed Brooksby area.

BRAD: How far from the current location to the new location?

DAREK: A few thousand feet.

MAYOR: It will save a bunch of pipe as well as having to cross that trench.

DAREK: The well was going to have to be redrilled anyway. I think it looks very promising that they will allow it to be moved. A survey will need to be completed. If there is not a mapped fault line within 600 feet then no geo-technical work will be required. J-U-B can be responsible for the entire project or the subcontractors can work directly with the city, it is usually easier that way. I have included a discretionary \$5,000 in the bid in case of any changes being made. With the additional \$5,000 I have estimated this project to cost \$94,000 and be completed by the end of the year.

MAYOR: The timeline would to build the tank next spring. Justin, is it okay to proceed from this point?

JUSTIN: I would like time to review the water fund and see where things are at.

BRAD: Having a water model will save money in the long run.

DAREK: It will show what our current available needs are; as well as future needs.

BRAD: It will show our maintenance needs as well.

DAREK: It is a master plan for the future as well.

MAYOR: How are we progressing in getting the historical data to USU?

JEFF: It will be delivered next week, we are meeting with Brad Cole. The D.U.P. is happy they got to make the copies they wanted.

MAYOR: How is the RAPZ tax signage?

MARLOWE: The plaques are made and need to be installed.

MAYOR: Does anyone know when we were incorporated, I was told next year is 150 years?

MARLOWE: The City was incorporated in 1864. It was founded in 1859.

CHRIS: Does anyone need a room for Tuesday night for the Utah League of Cities and Towns meetings?

JEFF: I would prefer one.

TERRIE: I will be driving down Wednesday morning.

BRAD: No, I won't need one. Are we going to have the same credit card problem as last year?

TERRIE: Chris did get it resolved last year.
