

RICHMOND CITY COUNCIL

JUNE 27, 2017

The regular meeting of the Richmond City Council was held at the Richmond City Office Building located at 6 West Main, Richmond, Utah on Tuesday, June 27, 2017. The meeting began at 7:00 P.M., Mayor Jeffrey Young was in the Chair. The opening remarks were made by Kelly Crafts.

The following Council members were in attendance: Paul Erickson, Tucker Thatcher, Cheryl Peck, Lyle Bair and Kelly Crafts.

City Manager Marlowe Adkins, City Engineer Darek Kimball, City Recorder Justin Lewis and City Treasurer Christine Purser were also in attendance.

APPROVAL OF CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

PAUL: I will abstain from voting on the approval of the minutes since I was not in attendance at the meeting.

A motion to approve the May 16, 2017 City Council meeting minutes was made by Tucker, seconded by Cheryl and the vote was unanimous.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

CHIEF TROY HOOLEY: We are having some troubles right now with daytime response. We are looking at several different options. We are currently looking for people willing to take the EMT class. The next class starts in September and lasts for three months. Two are enrolled and I am hoping for two more so we can send four total to the training. The flags for the Eagle Scout project are completed. Do you want Tanner to install them on the fire hydrants or the department?

MAYOR: What is your opinion?

CHIEF HOOLEY: I think Tanner should install them as part of his project. I will provide the necessary tools.

LYLE: I think Tanner should install them as well since it is his project. The firefighters already donate enough time.

MAYOR: Are they hard to install?

CHIEF HOOLEY: It is just a matter of removing the side cap and then reinstalling the cap with the flag. If the cap is loose the flag can rotate and fall down. I can show him how to keep them tight. Right now we have two department members fighting wildland fires. Chris Ross has already completed one deployment and is now on his second deployment. He has been going with the Brigham City Fire Department. Lance Jenkins is on the board as well and just waiting for a call to go. So far this month we have had four fire related calls and four EMS calls. We did an extrication training exercise recently where we cut off the roof of a car and removed the

doors as well. Elden Dattage Towing and Autobody Repair helped us out on the project and did not charge us anything for their time and service. We are going to convert the four wheel drive truck that used to be known as Squad 30 into Squad 31. The ambulance is now Squad 30 and the truck will be used in the winter time when a four wheel drive vehicle is needed. It can be used right now if needed as well. The extrication equipment unit is on Engine 30 and is fully functional. I am worried about the fire hazard coming up for the July 4th holiday with the tall dry grass and hot conditions.

PAUL: In the past we have not allowed fireworks to be lit east of 300 East.

MARLOWE: We have allowed residents in the affected areas to use the City park to light their fireworks as well.

CHIEF HOOLEY: The fire hazard was elevated to extreme today.

MAYOR: I was thinking we did not allow fireworks north of 300 North and east of 300 East.

CHIEF HOOLEY: We want to avoid anywhere near the hills to the east.

CHERYL: Do we have a city ordinance in place in this regard?

MARLOWE: No, we have just spread by word of mouth in the past.

MAYOR: We need to put something in place for the July 4th and July 24th holidays.

CHIEF HOOLEY: I would prefer nothing being allowed east of 300 East.

PAUL: My recommendation is nothing east of 300 East and nothing north of 500 North.

MAYOR: The goal is to keep the fireworks away from all open land and fields.

CHIEF: I am comfortable with Paul's recommendation.

MAYOR: Let's go with no fireworks can be lit north of 500 North and east of 300 East.

MARLOWE: I would suggest putting out a message on Parlant and Facebook immediately.

DEPUTY BRAD NELSON: Are the restrictions in affect now?

CHIEF HOOLEY: Yes, for the rest of the year. Fireworks are being sold right now so let's get this info affect immediately and make people aware.

DEPUTY'S REPORT

DEPUTY BRAD NELSON: I don't have anything new to report this evening.

KELLY: The City party will be on Friday, September 8th.

DEPUTY NELSON: I am thinking of bringing the canines this year. Is there anything else you want us to bring?

MAYOR: We are appreciative of anything you and the department bring. Whatever you can bring or want to bring is appreciated. Having the helicopter here was amazing.

DEPUTY NELSON: We now have two canine dogs and they have not been brought to the City party for a long time.

MAYOR: Do you have any updates on the burglary at the City office?

DEPUTY NELSON: Nothing official at this point. My understanding is burglary activity in the City is down recently compared to a few weeks ago.

MAYOR: I have noticed a lot of new graffiti at the old gas station on the highway.

DEPUTY NELSON: I will let the department know to monitor that building closer.

MAYOR: That particular building is getting in worse shape. Windows are broken and there is more graffiti all the time. The City party will start at 5:00 P.M. for the kid's rides and activities and dinner will start at 6:00 P.M. If your department can setup between 4:30 P.M. and 5:00 P.M. that would be great.

MARLOWE: I was asked by a resident to report there are people speeding at 200 North 300 East. Interestingly enough the person that was reported to be speeding did receive a citation in the City and came to our Court recently.

MAYOR: Next to the highway, 300 East is the most patrolled road in town.

BECKY CHRISTENSEN: The stop signs in the White Pine Subdivision are not being obeyed on 300 North and approximately 400 East and on 500 North at approximately 400 East.

MAYOR: We will notify the developer of this issue as well. There are many children in the area and everyone needs to pay attention.

JUSTICE COURT REPORT

JUDGE MATTHEW FUNK: The Court is quiet right now. We have seen a decline in the total number of cases over the last four to five years. This is the same across the State not just in Richmond. The volume of cases is down overall. It appears over the last year things have stabilized and we are quite consistent now. I am busy as almost all of the First District Court Justice Court judges now have new responsibilities. The District Court is now sending probable cause statements and search warrants to Justice Court judges to review so this adds additional work to our Court system. Right now this work is being split between four to five local judges in the valley. We each cover for one week at a time. I oversee search warrants one out of every twelve weeks. When on-call for search warrants I have to be available 24 hours per day.

CHERYL: How many would you sign on average?

JUDGE FUNK: On a busy holiday weekend like July 4th it will be more than normal. On a non-holiday week I would expect one or two during the night and three or four during the day. The First District Court includes Cache County, Rich County and Box Elder County. It is done through a computerized system. Numbers don't tell the entire story though of what exactly is involved.

MAYOR: As we approach July and August I know I have received calls from residents asking how irrigation water share and turn citations are handled and addressed.

JUDGE FUNK: The irrigation company calls in a complaint. An officer is dispatched and in some cases a ticket is issued. The person who was cited then needs to come to Court. Generally there are two kinds of water violations. The most uncommon one is when someone blatantly does something wrong. Then we get into the he said/she said arguments which are the most common. The recommended fine for blatant violations is \$600. In the cases that are he said/she said if the case actually moves forward it is usually a \$50 fine. Sometimes cases are dismissed as well. Terry Spackman is the President of the irrigation company and the person the Court deals with when needed.

TUCKER: What is the charge? Is it a misdemeanor?

JUDGE FUNK: Yes, which is the highest case we can handle. The fine could be as much as \$1,800 with 180 days in jail.

TUCKER: Does it go on a person's record?

JUDGE FUNK: It can if they plead to the charge. Most of the time cases are where the person did not know the irrigation company had gone on irrigation water turns. I want to hear the entire case and both sides of the story. I have seen a couple of repeat violators. I had one defendant that it took three years to work through the system and that is rare and was a unique case.

MAYOR: I get asked this question often so thank you for the explanation. How many tickets are issued on an average year?

JUDGE FUNK: I would say only two or three. I would also like to comment on traffic citations. Around 99% of speeding tickets are issued on the highway. Vary rarely do I see a ticket issued on 300 East. I only see a couple a year from there. We are dealing with abuse cases on occasion. The Court is only setup to deal with guilt and innocence and not counseling. In the abuse cases we try and get the victim with a victim's advocate to help them out as well as counseling.

MAYOR: What cases can you handle in our Court?

JUDGE FUNK: We deal with infractions like Class C and Class D misdemeanors. They usually consist of first or second time DUI cases. We handle retail theft and some domestic abuse cases. We can also handle some types of drug possession cases. Traffic violations are the main citation we deal with.

YOUTH COUNCIL REPORT

TAMARA PULLEN: Black & White Days is over and we made right around \$3,000 from operating the Hamburger Stand.

CHERYL: Have you ever done that well before?

JUSTIN: Not that I am aware of or can recall.

TAMARA: The weather was great. We barely had any items leftover. The movie night was a success and we really appreciated the Deputies being here and talking to the kids. Recently we did a karaoke party one night and a citywide garage sale this past Saturday. The garage sale was a success. The kids are wanting to do a dance on the Friday before school starts.

LYLE: I am good with that.

TAMARA: The City park has been reserved. There will be a police presence that evening at the park. Last year the dance was a big success. We won't be using a disc jockey this year. We want the dance to go from 8:00 P.M. until 11:00 P.M. Can we have a booth at the City party to hopefully recruit more kids for the upcoming year?

MAYOR: Yes.

TAMARA: I also send out letters in the fall to the parents of the eighth grade students letting them know about it.

PAUL: Well done on everything that has been accomplished in the last year.

LORA SMITH: Do you plan to do the garage sale yearly?

TAMARA: I hope so.

LORA: I think the Library generated around \$100 in revenue from what we sold at the yard sale.

BUSINESS LICENSES

JSR PERFORMANCE, LLC

RONNIE SOLDERS: I moved to town about two years ago and have lived in the valley for seven years. I want to sell automotive parts for General Motors vehicles out of my garage. I have worked on cars all my life and want to sell performance parts.

CHERYL: What exactly are performance parts?

RONNIE: I want to sell OEM and aftermarket parts that will make vehicles perform better. These parts are for all ages of vehicles. I would mainly sell the parts online but hope to have a storefront in the future.

TUCKER: Will you be warehousing the parts at your home?

RONNIE: I will have a small amount at my home but mainly items will be shipped online from place to place.

PAUL: You mention you will be selling parts. Are you planning on working on cars at your home?

RONNIE: No. I might test some parts at home and would consider doing some custom builds later on but not right now. I do make some custom brackets and do some software performance charts at home.

PAUL: When you are making custom brackets that could involve some noise. What will your hours be so you don't disturb your neighbors?

RONNIE: Only during the day. I work full-time from 3:00 to 11:00 and will continue to work there.

PAUL: Since you reside in a residential neighborhood we have a concern for noise and want it limited.

RONNIE: I won't be working past 5:00 P.M. I have an open pasture area around my home so I shouldn't bother anyone.

PAUL: In the future if you decide to work on cars at your home you need to come back in and discuss with the council. There is a limit on the number of vehicles that can stay at your place overnight that don't belong to you. Will you have any chemicals at your home?

RONNIE: No. I won't be doing oil changes or anything like that other than on my own vehicles.

A motion to approve the business license request for JSR Performance LLC (Ronnie Solders) was made by Paul, seconded by Tucker and the vote was unanimous.

HIGH CREEK LANDSCAPING, LLC

BECKY CHRISTENSEN: My husband is considering an employment change. He currently works out of town and does landscaping on the side on weekends when he is home. He is considering doing this full-time. We have a skidster and a trailer right now. We won't be doing any work at our home other than on our own yard. All of the work will be at the customer's place.

PAUL: Do you have any mowers? Where will you store items?

BECKY: Right now we just have the skidster and trailer. We can store the skidster in the garage if needed or we will rent a place to store everything.

A motion to approve the business license request for High Creek Landscaping, LLC (Kevin Christensen) was made by Lyle, seconded by Paul and the vote was unanimous.

PLAYFUL PUMPKINS, LLC

AMY JORGENSEN: I want to open a childcare facility. I need to have a backup plan in place for my family. I am going to have a baby with a heart defect and we are not sure what this will involve. We want to make sure he has proper care. There will not be any noise issues with our neighbors as we live in a secluded area. I am making sure we are properly licensed and will have insurance for liability reasons. We want to have the best resources available for our child, if needed.

TUCKER: How many kids will you have at your home?

AMY: The State has done a pre-inspection on our property and the number of children allowed is based on the square footage of the home and other items. They said we could have up to 18 children. Having that many children there would require several adults to be there as well. There are factors such as the age of the child and whether any of the children have parents working at the facility. It usually requires one adult for every four children. I need this as an option for extra income for my family if needed. I have done all of the pre-licensing training. We are currently reviewing the requirements for fencing and other things.

PAUL: This is an important service for the community.

A motion to approve the business license request for Playful Pumpkins, LLC (Amy Jorgensen) was made by Tucker, seconded by Cheryl and the vote was unanimous.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE VOTE ON A REQUEST FOR A SINGLE SUBDIVISION OF PROPERTY ON THE NORTHEAST CORNER OF 100 EAST 200 NORTH.

JASON WARD: I would like to split the parcel into three lots. The total acreage of the entire parcel is just under two acres. I would like to put a new home on a new proposed lot south of the existing home.

PAUL: The zoning for the area is medium density so ¼ acre or more is required.

JASON: At this point I think the new house will face to the south. We will keep the existing home as it is. The remaining pasture area and barn north of the home will stay as it is at this point.

PAUL: Do you know the size of the pasture area?

JASON: I think around 1.45 acres. My intent is to sell the lot with the existing house on it as well as the new building lot south of the home. I intend to keep the pasture area for myself at this time and to leave it as a pasture.

PAUL: Keep in mind if you develop the pasture in the future it could fall under different rules and guidelines for roads, access, fire department apparatus turnaround and infrastructure.

JASON: I am aware and from a cost analysis perspective it makes no sense financially to develop the pasture at this time.

TUCKER: The Planning Commission approved the request and did not have any concerns.

A motion to approve the subdivision of Parcel Number 09-049-0022 from one parcel into three parcels was made by Paul, seconded by Lyle and the vote was unanimous.

INTRODUCTION, DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE PASSAGE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO SIGN AN AGREEMENT FOR RICHMOND CITY TO PARTICIPATE IN THE BEAR RIVER MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL HAZARD MITIGATION PLANNING PROCESS.

JUSTIN: The City needs to participate in the Bear River Region multi-jurisdictional hazard mitigation plan process in order to be able to apply for FEMA funding in the future if needed. If we do not participate we cannot apply for funding in the future. This same request is being made to each city and town in the County. Right now we are not planning on applying for any FEMA funding that I am aware of but the City needs the option to do so in the future if needed.

A motion to approve Richmond City to participate in the Bear River Multi-jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Planning Process was made by Paul, seconded by Tucker and the vote was unanimous.

CONTINUED DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE VOTE ON REACTIVATING THE RICHMOND CITY HISTORICAL COMMISSION.

MAYOR: Tucker has done some research on this topic. Scott Tripp, who made this request, is actually located in the County not within the City boundary. We will recommend Scott work with the County Historical Commission as we have been informed there is one and that is best for him where he resides in the County. At this time we will not consider reestablishing a historical commission as a request has not been made by any residents.

PUBLIC HEARING ON MAKING ADJUSTMENTS TO THE BUDGET FOR THE PERIOD OF JULY 1, 2016 THROUGH JUNE 30, 2017.

JUSTIN: It is the end of the budget year and we need to make some adjustments to the budget as we close out the year. The most noticeable increases to revenue will be for franchise tax collected, building permit fees, penalty interest, garbage service, central dispatch fee, recycling and Black & White Days sponsorship fees. Expense increases will be for utilities in several departments, garbage service, central dispatch and recycling. As more homes are built more revenue is collected for garbage service, recycling service and 911 service and expenses are increased as well. The Fire Department was in need of updating all of their supplies and doing

some building maintenance. An increase is needed in the Library fund to wages as it was an unknown of the exact financial impact of when Juliene would retire and when Lora was hired how much of a crossover would be required. Increases were made to water and sewer impact fee revenue as well as monthly service fees.

A motion to close the regular Council meeting and open the public hearing was made by Cheryl, seconded by Paul and the vote was unanimous.

MONTHLY FINANCIAL REVIEW WITH DISCUSSION AND DECISIONS AS NECESSARY.

JUSTIN: As part of our yearly budget we need you to approve the wages for the employees for the upcoming budget year. Some employees received a 3.0% cost of living increase while others did not change. Those who did not change had their wage adjusted in the last budget year or changed positions in the City so their wage was adjusted at that time. This does include changing the roll on/roll off dumpster works to \$9.00 per hour and the Fire Department members will receive \$9.00 per call rather than the \$8.00 they received in the past. There were not any changes to the Mayor or Council member stipend amount.

MAYOR: We will need to add a third crossing guard to this list as we have committed to having three at this time.

JUSTIN: The new crossing guard will be at \$375 per month. The numbers you approve also include Christmas bonus amounts as well.

A motion to approve the wages and stipends for Fiscal Year 2018 was made by Kelly, seconded by Tucker and the vote was unanimous.

JUSTIN: The election sign up period has closed. There are two candidates for Mayor. There are three candidates for three open Council positions. There will not be a primary election. The general election will be held on Tuesday, November 7th. The election results must be canvassed no sooner than 7 days after the election and no later than 14 days after the election. The Council meeting in November is scheduled for the 21st so we will be in compliance as long as we don't move the Council meeting date. In regards to the financials, building permit revenue is still increasing because of all of the new homes being built in the White Pine Subdivision. Black & White Days brought in just under \$9,000 in revenue with the biggest contributor being the Hamburger Stand that the Youth Council oversaw. The Black & White Days breakfast brought in \$1,391. Sponsorship fees collected this year were down a little bit from last year as right now we have collected \$5,475. Last year we collected approximately \$5,800. We were reimbursed by UDOT (Utah Department of Transportation) for the two decorative street lights they hit and ruined over the winter. We also received payment from an insurance company for the decorative

street light that was ruined by North Cache Middle School. The new street lights have been ordered and should be here anytime. A couple of years ago the State Auditor changed how utilities are accounted for on City owned properties. We are required to charge each City-owned property and building for water and sewer service just like any resident would pay. I have included those amounts for the fiscal year in the June financials. We have paid an additional \$2,500 this month into the Cub River Sports Complex Fund. Impact fees collected for water total \$112,636 so far this fiscal year and \$140,611 for sewer impact fees collected this fiscal year. The annual payment on the water tank project loan will be made this evening in the amount of \$246,961.

COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS

LYLE: I don't have any additional items to report since Chief Hooley updated us on the Fire Department earlier this evening.

MAYOR: I would like Justin to give us an update on the rental house remodeling project.

JUSTIN: The cabinets and counter tops were installed in the kitchen area and bathroom today. The trim will now be completed, touch up painting done and the two bedrooms carpeted. We will also have a plumber come in and finish installing the fixtures.

MAYOR: Do we want to manage the rental house in the future or have a property management company do it?

PAUL: Do we know how much they charge?

MAYOR: I think around 10%.

LYLE: How much can we rent the house for a month?

MAYOR: I have been told in the \$900 to \$1,000 range.

PAUL: A rental contract needs to be put in place as well.

MAYOR: I think that is one of the biggest reasons to go with a property management company is they handle everything like that which is needed.

PAUL: I agree.

TUCKER: Or we could consider selling the home to help pay for the Park School renovation project.

LYLE: If we are having to pay to renovate the rental house every few years we will never recover our investment.

MAYOR: Right now we don't know if we need that property long term.

PAUL: We could consider selling it.

TUCKER: I would recommend we keep the pasture even if we sell the home.

PAUL: Let's find out the value of the home. I don't see us expanding in this area in the future. It could be better to sell now than rent.

TUCKER: By selling it that would help to fund the renovation project which is going to be expensive.

PAUL: The market value of the home will never be higher.

MAYOR: I will contact Vern and Marian Fielding and ask them to do a market analysis for us.

LYLE: We need to consider all options.

PAUL: Let's get a price for the home and the home with the pasture included.

MAYOR: The City did a good job in purchasing that parcel long ago when the idea of taking over Park School was not even an option. Until now the only option for the City to expand was where the rental house and pasture are located.

PAUL: With the acquisition of Park School everything has changed.

JUSTIN: Something else that needs to be considered is most likely in the next decade or two the City is going to need a new fire station. There is not enough room for a larger station where they are currently located so they will need to go elsewhere. The area where the rental house is could be a spot for a new fire station.

MAYOR: Or across the road from Park School would be another logical place for a fire station when needed. I would feel better about just selling the home and keeping the pasture at this time.

KELLY: I will be out of town on July 18th and won't be able to attend that Council meeting. The City party is on Friday, September 8th. What do I need to get arranged?

JUSTIN: You will want to contact Karen Jenkins about the rides and get them on her calendar. The budget for the rides is \$1,500.

MAYOR: I will get with you and go over the food and other items we need to get and consider.

MAYOR'S REPORT

MAYOR: Marlowe needs to give us an update on our wildland fire agreement.

MARLOWE: We have to do approximately \$619 worth of labor as part of our agreement. The Fire Department has done some training that is applied towards this amount. Another project we have been approved for is weeding and removing brush from around the water sources we have in the Cherry Creek area. It needs to be done after July 4th. The Fire Department can bring their brush truck to have onsite in case a fire is started when the removing the weeds and debris. I need help organizing this project.

MAYOR: Let's turn the project over to the Fire Department and they can be responsible and take care of it.

LYLE: I will contact Chief Hooley and let him know what is going on and what is needed.

MAYOR: Justin please update the Council on RAPZ tax approvals for this year.

JUSTIN: The City will receive \$4,572 for the annual population based assessment we can use on a qualifying project. The City applied for \$75,000 for the trail project on 300 East. This application was not approved. A second application was submitted for some work on the Black & White Days building in the amount of \$30,000. The main portion of this project being a new roof on the building. This application was approved. Historically the County has contacted the City in the past and let us know what funds are available and which project we would like the funding applied. This year that did not happen so we did not even have the option to have the \$30,000 applied to the trail project rather than the Black & White Days building.

MAYOR: I am still learning on this process as this was my first year to submit the RAPZ tax proposals. We will get a new roof on the building as well as some concrete work and other items.

MARLOWE: What are we doing on the roof of the Post Office as we were contacted by the United States Postal Service about re-roofing the building? The inspector said a new roof is needed.

MAYOR: I want to get an independent opinion from a roofing company if the building actually needs to be redone. At that time we can evaluate what will or will not be done.

A motion to adjourn and pay bills was made by Paul, seconded by Tucker and the vote was unanimous.
