Museum Day: Saturday, September 24th is the official Utah Museum Day. Museums throughout Utah are to be open that day. Our museum/relic hall will be open from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. If you haven't had a chance to visit before, some very interesting

artifacts and photographs are on display. Even if you are a “move-in” this can be a real experience in getting a feeling for what our “early days” were like. The new history book will be available, cost is \$20.00.

Historic Home Tour: The 2011 Historic Home Tour will take place on Saturday, September 10th, the day after our City Party. The tour goes from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. and includes two locations in the Richmond area. The Hattie Merrill Morrison farmstead, which dates from 1908, is located at 1367 South State (also known as “Whiskey Bend” – and there is a story behind that!) is stop number three of six. Stop number four is the James and Amy Burnham farmstead, which dates from 1895, is located at 563 South State – currently known as the Rockhill Creamery. Time it right, and you can enjoy products from the Richmond Harvest Market which takes place there each summer Saturday between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. This tour is presented by the Cache Valley Historical Society and the Cache Valley Visitors Bureau. Tour tickets are available for \$10 and can be purchased at Lee’s Market Place in Smithfield and Logan, the Cache Valley Visitors Bureau at 199 North Main, and at Macey’s Food and Drug in Providence.
