Prohibited Items in Roll-on, Roll-off Bins:

Just another quick reminder that the following items are not to be placed into the roll-on, roll-off bins: Liquid paint; Oil or oil products (petroleum); Antifreeze; Pesticides or Herbicides; Cleaning products; Vehicle tires of any size or type; Batteries (vehicle-type); Refrigerators; Freezers; Contractor debris; any other type of hazardous materials; wet garbage. **Our citizens have been extremely cooperative in this matter;** however, if you see anyone putting these materials in the bin(s) after hours, please contact a member of the City Council or Staff immediately, or the Cache County Sheriff's Office (716-9400) if you cannot contact anyone at the City. Note the license number of any vehicle involved if you can, but please DO NOT attempt to intervene personally. We want to have the Deputies take care of this in a careful, legal manner so that we can prosecute to the maximum.

Thanks to all of you for your understanding and cooperation relative to these bins during the week before and during "Black & White Days." We had to make some accommodations so that the Black & White Committee could get the pavilion area cleaned up and ready for one of the few remaining displays and judging of this kind remaining.

Mosquito's and Standing Water:

Although our weather has been "interesting" for the past two months, it is a good personal and family safety alert to be sure you get rid of standing water. Even a small can that has collected rain or sprinkler water can be the breeding area of literally thousands of mosquito's. If you have natural depressions

around your yard where water will collect in pools that last, maybe a shovel or two full of dirt and/or gravel will eliminate a breeding ground and save you a bit on mosquito repellants.

Irrigation Notice: The Richmond Irrigation Company has requested that we provide notice to all residents that only individuals owning Richmond Irrigation Company water shares can legally use irrigation water. Every person using the water must own at least one share of stock in the company and have previously paid the required hook-up fees.
