Library Construction: Thanks to a generous bequest from Gordon and Betsy Olson, our Carnegie library will see some much-needed improvements done this fall. Nearly all of the windows will be replaced with energy efficient, UV reducing glass. The roof on the north side will be replaced, and drainage for the run-off from rain and melting snow/ice will be directed away from the building (no more water in the basement!). You'll also see a new entry--door, transom, etc. Local contractor Western Construction will oversee the work. If anyone is interested in salvaging the nearly 100-year-old windows, please contact Terrie at (435) 770-9061 to make arrangements for payment etc.

Preparing For Winter: Just a reminder that our winter parking regulations go into effect on **November 1st**. This prohibits the parking of any type of vehicle on the street between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m. We also ask that you be sure that the "parking area" (City right-of-way) is clear of any type of obstacle for safety reasons. The snow plow drivers are partially blinded by the spray of snow coming over the plow blade, and we don't want an accident caused by the blade striking a vehicle or other object in the right-of-way area. Your cooperation will be very much appreciated.
