

Remember to enroll in Richmond City's Emergency Alert & Community Communication System. The system will allow for the entire

community to be reached as well as just select residents or groups of residents. Notifications can be sent for emergencies (such as flooding) or notices regarding road closures and water line breaks, to name a few other instances.

The enrollment form is available at the city office and on the city website (www.richmond-utah.com). The completed forms may be turned in to the city office or emailed to communityresponse@richmond-utah.com.

A text and text email will be sent through the system on Saturday, May 10, at 8:00 a.m. If you are signed up but *do not* receive the message, please email communityresponse@richmond-utah.com and let us know.



Cache County has adopted the 2014 weed control policy. It will function in accordance with the 1971 Utah State Noxious Weed Act and Cache County Ordinance (79-11) to organize, supervise, and coordinate a noxious weed control plan for Cache County. It has been posted on the city website on the Links page.

Cache County encourages all landowners to have a Weed Control Strategy and encourages commercial and private weed control efforts where possible. The county weed control personnel will help provide informational and organizational help when possible.

Current weed control practices will be used including chemical, biological, cultural and mechanical methods.

The Utah Department of Agriculture & Food (UDAF) has a website with more information and links to a variety of topics on noxious weeds at <http://ag.utah.gov/plants-pests/noxious-weeds.html>.

In addition to the list of noxious weeds identified by UDAF, Cache County has declared three more: poison hemlock, puncture vine, and goatsrue.

The city encourages all property owners to be aware of the noxious weeds on their property and to comply with the state and county statutes for controlling the spread of the weeds.

Numerous control methods exist that can be as effective as the ‘traditional’ herbicide

(chemical) application. Check with your local county extension office for more information (752-6263 or <http://extension.usu.edu/cache/>).

Harvest Market at Rockhill

The market opens at Rockhill Creamery (563 S State) on Saturday, June 7, and will continue through October 18th. Fresh produce, meat from locally raised livestock, farm eggs, and more can be found every Saturday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Harvest Market. Several vendors also offer local honey, home-baked breads and treats (under the Cottage Kitchen Permit from UDAF), and hand-crafted items.

And then there's the Farmstead Cheese Stand where you can taste some of the cheeses offered by Rockhill Creamery and buy your favorites as well as a number of other locally produced foods.

Dr. Taira Koybaeva biography

Dr. Taira Koybaeva is an experienced globalization expert with 19+ years of proven results in facilitating international projects for agencies such as NASA, U.S. Congress, U.S. Air Force, Department of Defense as well as

aerospace giants like Lockheed Martin, Ball Aerospace, and Orbital Science.

Dr. Taira Koybaeva's international expertise began by receiving education from premier universities in Russia, Germany, Switzerland, and the U.S. Through her work as an international relations advisor with the largest multinational R&D programs in the world she was able to:

- facilitate a turn-around of a \$500+ million project by helping to secure presidential approvals and organizing congressional hearings.
- mediate negotiation of international contracts.
- co-develop program documentation that would subsequently be used by the International Space Station.
- assist in taking a yearly budget from \$1 million to \$50+ million in less than 5 years.

As a cultural expert Dr. Koybaeva worked with various international agencies such as the Canadian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Norwegian Embassy in the United States, The Russian Federation, Ukrainian and Tajik Governments.

While applying her international expertise practically, Dr. Koybaeva was simultaneously developing a system for turning companies into global players through her research and work as a professor at Utah State University and fellow at MIT.
