Impact Fee Questions

In June, the Richmond City council adopted an updated ordinance for impact fees and hook-up fees for the culinary and sewer systems. The fees for the culinary water system are the same regardless of where you are in the city. However, the fees for the sewer system are different between the north and south areas of the city.

Why the difference?

In 2011, a sewer master plan was completed. The collections system and capacity were reviewed and a list of deficiencies was created. There are two trunk lines that collect and carry the sewage west to the wastewater treatment plant. One serves the north end, the other the south; the dividing line for north and south is roughly along Main Street.

Several projects to correct the deficiencies were identified as needing to be done in the next 5 years. One of those is at about 150 North 600 West.

The project is to increase the capacity of the sewer trunk line. The majority of projected growth in the city is on the north end and will feed into the main line. It will run from about 200 North and go from the highway to the railroad tracks. The current line is simply too narrow to handle the increased load so it needs to be increased in size.

New residents and businesses in the north end will be paying for this added capacity. Since those in the south end will not see any benefit, the sewer impact fee is less in that area. Hook-up fees remain the same whether you're in the north or south end.

If you're currently hooked up to the culinary and sewer system, these fees will not affect you.
