As required by the passage on June 7th by the Richmond City Council of Resolution 2016-2 entitled "A Resolution to Initiate the Creation of the Cache Water District" a public hearing will be held on Tuesday, July 12th, 2016, at 7:15 p.m. in the City Council chambers and as part of the scheduled City Council meeting."

Irrigation Company Reminder

The Richmond Irrigation Company is taking this opportunity to remind all shareholders of the responsibilities of the Company to deliver water through its mainline to all of the various users. We are responsible for providing water from the High Creek diversion to the pipeline's terminus on Utah State University's farm just to the south of town. The Company is responsible for all costs associated with maintaining the nearly-seven-miles of pipeline.

As repairs are made to the weakest parts of our system, we would like to remind everyone that only Schedule 40, or higher, PVC pipe

should be used, and every connection should be cleaned thoroughly, primed with purple PVC primer and glued with "711" (gray) PVC cement. Everyone's system should be able to handle 80 PSI at minimum.

Each lateral that is connected to the company's mainline is a separate entity and governed as such. The individual shareholders who own laterals that connect to the mainline directly are fully responsible for repairs and maintenance on those private laterals. Each of those private laterals have an isolation valve (shut-off) that allows those individuals to do repairs to their system without impacting the rest of the Company's shareholders.

Most of the shareholders that reside in city limits are connected to the more-common larger laterals. They are either connected to the large lateral directly, or connected to "spur" laterals that have several users sharing the main connection to the large lateral.

It is important that each shareholder takes responsibility to install an isolation valve (shut-off) at their connection to either the spur or large lateral. This will allow for repairs and maintenance on those shareholder's systems without shutting water off to their neighbors. Please check with your neighbors or Chris Hart (Watermaster; 890-4382) if you are unsure of your connection.

The Company encourages the governing bodies of each large lateral to require isolation valves at each spur.
