Be Informed: City Budget

Richmond is growing: our population is currently at 2,600. At the February 22nd State of the City address, Mayor Young touched on a number of topics including the possibility of a property tax increase.

The last time property taxes were adjusted was around 1978. The 1980 population was 1,705. With the growth in the city (population, infrastructure, emergency services) comes the need for increased services provided by the city. Expenses have increased over several decades while revenue has stayed the same.

A public hearing on the proposed 2018-2019 budget will be held during the city council meeting on Tuesday, May 15. The proposed budget includes a proposed increase of property tax to \$200,000 from the current \$110,000.

Utah Code requires the city council to adopt the budget first (which will be at the June meeting) then to hold a public hearing in August before voting on the tax increase in September.

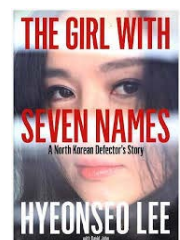
